- There is currently **no single data source** to support the comparative analysis of the **wellbeing of children and young people across Europe as they grow up**.
- GUIDE (Growing Up In Digital Europe: EuroCohort) will be Europe's first comparative birth cohort survey.
- a Research Infrastructure that will be an important source of high quality longitudinal statistical evidence to support the development of social policies which will enhance the wellbeing of children, young people and their families across Europe for many years to come.

Tentative topics for next courses: Methodological and analytical aspects of longitudinal research, Multilevel modelling of repeated measures data, Latent growth curve modelling in AMOS (maybe also in some other program), Mediation analyses of longitudinal data using cross-lagged panel models, Introduction to structural equation modelling with R and Mplus, Binary logistic regression analysis of cross-sectional and longitudinal data in SPSS. Training for non-scientific, national stakeholders

- Is aimed at a broader network of users beyond those working in a university environment, incl. policy professionals based in NGOs and governmental bodies.
- 1 day introductory course on longitudinal and cohort data.

NIDI will host a 'train-the-trainer' workshop in which up to 10 '**national champions**' will be introduced to the concepts and design of the course and taught how to administer the course.

Materials will be **translated** in national languages and 3-4 **courses per country** are to be held.
